Is it worth considering whether "Hive" is **really** required for Umbraco? Sure, it sounds awesome as a theoretical idea, but I wonder how many people will use Umbraco with anything but the default provider? Has any research actually been done into whether there is demand for it? One of the classic mistakes of any software project is to design things around what developers think sounds good without regard to whether customers are asking for it. Software developers are not often the best people to decide the requirements of a project, and I wonder whether this has happened here? I remember Niels saying that he designed the original Umbraco because he wanted a CMS that he could build the kind of sites he wanted. In other words, he was a site builder first for customers and a developer second. Has this philosophy somehow been lost? It's worth remembering that the ultimate end users of Umbraco are **end-users** and not developers.

I kind of get the feeling that 99.9% of Umbraco users will use SQL Server and of those 99.9% will use the default Hive provider. So if the layers of abstraction needed to create hive cripple performance is it worth it (despite it being a really cool concept)? The same goes for a massively normalised database. It may well be "best practice" but does it perform (because customers don't care about database schemas but they do care about performance)? And whilst we are asking these questions we were told that the old XML caching was removed because it didn't scale. But again, I imagine 99.9% of all Umbraco sites would never get to a size where this was remotely a problem. And would a Lucene-backed disk cache be any better than an XML? At least XML is naturally hierarchical and, most importantly, human readable which can be really useful when developing. I just think it needs some open discussion and feedback on whether the problems that are being solved are actually problems at all.
